The Lighthouse Keeper's Quest at Cape Otway is run for a few hours or up to five days by outdoor education specialist and modern day lighthouse keeper Paul Thompson. He gears the program to match students' needs and the curriculum. The activities are great.

On arrival at the 1848 Lightstation, children discover the first keeper has been sacked, and it's up to them to keep the light operational. They love the challenges, reliving history, their journey of self-discovery, and spotting wildlife.

The Lightstation's amazing location, plus its Aboriginal history, Telegraph Station and WW2 radar bunker, means students learn about Koori culture, shipwrecks, immigration, geography, communication, and conservation.

The Lightstation, set on a stunning coastline, and the surrounding Great Otway National

Park provide the perfect backdrop to achieve VELS outcomes within a unique program.

Kids enjoy the Quest because they learn how to work as a team, communicate, and problem-solve - it's great for self-esteem. They also learn about leadership, orienteering, and bushcraft.

Teachers love the program - the Lightstation organises all transport, accommodation, equipment and meals. It also appeals to Kids looking for an exciting school holiday program. The Lightstation does pick-ups in Melbourne and Geelong.
